'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? 38 When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? 39 When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' 40 "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' ~Matthew 25:35-40

A familiar text has become the bold vision for our (PCUSA) denomination. The Presbyterian Mission Agency has discerned that Matthew 25 will lead us into how we will engage in the world around us. Convicted by this passage, both the 222nd and 223rd General Assemblies (2016 and 2018) exhorted the PC(USA) to act boldly and compassionately to serve people who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned or poor. An invitation has gone out to all churches to become a Matthew 25 church. The hope of the call is that it will unite all Presbyterians to become a more relevant presence in the world.



#### Why the initiative?

"God calls us boldly and compassionately so that faith comes alive and the world wakes up to new possibilities." - Presbyterian Mission Agency

#### Where to begin?

There are already PC(USA) congregations that identify themselves as Matthew 25 churches. The Presbytery Mission Agency aims to help multiply this loving commitment to radical and fearless discipleship by partnering with mid congregations to help them embrace one or more of these three focuses:

Building congregational vitality by challenging people and congregations to deepen their faith and get actively and joyfully engaged with their community and the world. **Dismantling structural racism** by advocating and acting to break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color.

Eradicating systemic poverty by working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

I am asking SPC to engage in discernment, conversation, and prayer about joining other churches in our city and across the country about pledging to become a Matthew 25 church. We are already doing much of the work and ministry in our community. 

It has been my pleasure to play my hammered dulcimer on several occasions at the church lately. This type of musical instrument dates back at least to the year 900 AD and spread from the Middle East both to the East and West. It goes by many names. In Hungary it is called a Cymbalon. In China the name means "visiting zither". In Germany it is called "Hackbreckt" literally "chopping board". It arrived in America in colonial days and was popular in lumber camps to play lively tunes and jigs. Some called it a "whamadiddle". The names refer to the way it is played by striking the strings with small mallets called hammers. This is different from the Appalachian or mountain dulcimer, a smaller lap instrument with 3 or 4 strings which are strummed.




A great team of volunteers send notes and goodie packages to

A very generous gift from the Sedgefield Colony Garden Club (\$2800) last year helped make it possible for us again this Christmas to provide gifts for the 39 children! Each Christmas, Carla Farrington, SES Guidance Counselor, and Vivian Ilama, interpreter for SES, and teachers choose families who have very limited incomes and would not be able to provide Christmas gifts for their children.

Thank you so much for supporting the Angel Tree year after year. Parents are always amazed at the generous and beautifully wrapped gifts for their children! Sometimes we never know the joy and excitement that a simple gift can bring to a child on Christmas morning.

#### 2019 BENEVOLENCE FUND REPORT

"Then the king will reply to them, I assure you that when you have done it for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you have done it for me.' ~Matthew 25: 40

As Christians, we are called to help those experiencing poverty in our community from being evicted from their homes, having their utilities disconnected or not being able to heat their homes. Emergency assistance funds at Greensboro Urban Ministry (GUM) and Salvation Army are limited and they have to turn to Greensboro Congregational Assistance Network (GCAN) and churches to provide additional assistance after the need has been verified. When eviction papers are served or utilities disconnected, families who have the least amount of resources are faced with additional charges for court costs or reconnection fees.

Because of your support to our Benevolence Fund and our partnership with GCAN, in 2019 we were able to provide emergency assistance to 35 families (\$4492.54) in our community.

Benevolence Expenses: \$3804.07, emergency assistance for rent, Duke Energy, Piedmont Natural Gas and emergency hotel stays; \$688.47 food assistance, Green Card, gas card, miscellaneous; \$130.38, food for two FaithAction ID Drives; \$42.17 contribution to Sedgefield Elementary for school dance. Total Contributions from Benevolence Fund: \$4665.09

As affordable housing continues to be a big challenge for many in our community, the need for utility and rent assistance will be needed. Sometimes as little as \$35 can keep someone from having their utilities disconnected or \$100 can prevent an eviction! THANK YOU SO MUCH to all who contributed in 2019. Your continued contribution of any amount does make a difference! An offering to the Benevolence Fund is received the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of each month and each Sunday in the Adult Sunday School.

#### Did you know....

Some college students are hungry because they do not have enough food to eat? Numerous studies in recent years have found that 20-40% of community college and university students have experienced hunger. Rising tuition costs, reduced financial aid and student loans have helped contribute to college student food insecurity. Emily Saine, assistant director of the Wesley-Luther Campus Ministry at UNCG, states that 22% of their student population has gone without food for an extended period of time. When a student at UNCG is hungry, they can get help at the Spartan Open Pantry which is located at College Place United Methodist Church. This food pantry's purpose is to ensure that no one in the Spartan (UNCG) community goes hungry. Emily says they typically give out 20-30 bags of food each week.

We will have an opportunity this coming Sunday to help the Spartan Open Pantry by contributing to the **Souper Bowl of Caring** offering during worship. This offering will be given to the Spartan Open Pantry so much needed items can be purchased for students in need of food.

#### **Souper Bowl of Caring**

From \$5700 raised in 1990 to a total of more than \$150 million by 2019! This is the amount that has been raised for soup kitchens and food pantries throughout the US and the world since the first

Souper Bowl of Caring offering in 1990.

How did this offering begin? "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat." This simple prayer was given by Brad Smith in 1990, a seminary intern at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC. This youth group invited 22 other Columbia churches to participate in a special offering to benefit a local food pantry, raising \$5700. Since that time, youth groups throughout our country and the world have continued to raise money to help alleviate hunger through the Souper Bowl of Caring. Our youth/church has been participating in this offering since the mid 90's. Most years our offering has gone to the Greensboro Urban Ministry Food Pantry. Last year and again this year our Souper Bowl of Caring offering will support the Spartan Open Pantry. (Please see above article, Did You Know).

#### Cooking Matters Recipe of the Month

#### White Bean Basil Chicken Chili

#### Serving Size


Serves 6, 1 1/2 cups per serving

#### Ingredients

- 1 pound boneless chicken pieces
- 1 medium onion
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1 medium tomato
- 1 large lime
- 1/4 cup fresh cilantro leaves
- 1 Tablespoon fresh basil
- 2 (15½-ounce) cans great northern beans, no salt added
- 2 Tablespoons canola oil
- 4 cups low-sodium chicken broth
- 1½ teaspoons chili powder
- 1½ teaspoons ground cumin
- ½ teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

Optional Ingredients:

2 teaspoons red pepper flakes



#### Instructions

Remove any skin and excess fat from chicken pieces. Cut chicken into ½-inch cubes.

Rinse, peel, and finely chop onion. Peel and mince garlic.

Rinse tomato. Remove core and seeds. Chop.

Rinse lime. Cut in half. In a small bowl, squeeze juice from one half. Discard seeds.

Rinse and chop cilantro and basil.

In a colander, drain and rinse beans.

In a large pot over medium heat, heat oil. Add onion and garlic. Cook until onion is tender, about 5 minutes. If onion or garlic start to brown, lower heat.

Add chicken, beans, broth, spices, tomato, lime juice, basil, and cilantro. Stir. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cover. Simmer for 1 hour, stirring occasionally.

If using, top with red pepper flakes.

#### Chef's Notes

Use any canned beans you like in place of great northern beans.

Serve over a bed of cooked greens like spinach, kale, or chard. Or, serve over brown rice.

For a different flavor, use Thai basil instead of regular basil.
