Greetings Friends,

I love hearing scripture from another interpretation. I get energized when I hear text through another person's lens. In preparation for a sermon, I read the text in varying translations. The different lenses often allow me to see something in the scripture that I have never noticed before. It is kind of like how I am in the world. Most of the time I wear contact lenses, but when needed I use my reading glasses or prescription glasses. Each lens allows me to see but with a different focus. This past Sunday I preached on a familiar text; most of us refer to Matthew 5:1-12 as the Sermon on the Mount or the Beatitudes. The familiar sermon includes the words "Blessed are the ...", and you can fill in the rest from memory.



In his writing of "Tattoos on the Heart," Fr. Gregory Boyle offers a compelling argument that the Beatitudes is about geography rather than spirituality. He writes that "Scripture scholars contend that the original language of the Beatitudes should not be rendered as "Blessed are the single-hearted" or "Blessed are the peacemakers" or "Blessed are those who struggle for justice." Greater precision in translation would say, "You're in the right place if . . . you are single-hearted or work for peace." The Beatitudes tell us where to find our place to stand.

Those standing in the right place, have heard the Beatitudes through the lens of Steve Givens,

- You're in the right place if you can stand and embrace your poverty and that of others, for one day you will stand very close to God. Maybe you're already standing there.
- You're in the right place if you can stand before coffins and graves and cry, weeping for those now beyond your sight, for you will feel the arm of God around your shoulders.
- You're in the right place if you can stand behind and beneath others and let them go first and receive the best of everything, for you have much coming to you in the end.
- You're in the right place if you hunger and thirst for what is right, if justice brings you alive and injustice moves you to action, for you, someday, will be satisfied.
- You're in the right place if you speak words of mercy instead of aggression and accusation, for mercy will find its way back to you and make its home in you.
- You're in the right place if your words and actions are pure love, for you will see God in your own reflection.
- You're in the right place if you can make and embrace peace with those around you, no matter their faults, their addictions, their histories, their origins and leanings and orientations, for then you are accepting your given place as a child of God.
- You're in the right place if you are ruffling a few feathers, if you're hated for your hatred of injustice and your acceptance of the little, the weak and the oppressed, for you will find yourself sitting in the lap of God.

This interpretation of the Beatitudes is asking to look at where we are standing to see if we are in the right place. Where are you called to stand in 2023?



Every week since school began in August, we have delivered between 50 and 60 bags of food to Sedgefield Elementary School. ## **Grapevine Feb 2023 and Benevolence 2022 Year End Report**

*"What would be missed if Sedgefield Presbyterian Church didn't exist?"*

*This question is often asked of churches.*

*Imagine it is the end of 2021 and Sedgefield Presbyterian Church had to close its doors. Then in 2022.....*

- 26 children in our community would not have received Christmas gifts purchased by some members in our congregation and community
- 50-100 children from Sedgefield Elementary School who depend on a backpack of food on Fridays would not have had food for the weekends
- a family would have been evicted from their apartment had our church and 3 other churches not responded to a request from Greensboro Urban Ministry's Emergency Assistance program to pay a month's rent to avoid the eviction
- 60-80 children at Colt's Run Apartments would not have experienced the fun of playing under a firetruck hose on a hot day, playing Japanese drums and making a fresh flower arrangement to take home after enjoying a meal donated by Jake's Diner
- 8 teens aging out of Foster Care in our community would not have had an opportunity to graduate from a 6 week Cooking Matters class where they learned how to prepare healthy meals on a limited budget
- Several families would have struggled to put food on their tables had we not provided gift cards from local grocery stores

*The above examples are but a few of the ways your contributions of time and financial support have enabled SPC to continue to be a presence and help to so many in our community. Our pastor, Kim, invites us every Sunday in her sermons to respond to Jesus' call to "feed the hungry, help those in need and be a voice for justice".*



## About the Music Through Lent

Lent: preparation through drawing deeper and closer to the Creator for the upcoming celebration of Easter

I remember observing Lent while growing up. In a very non-Presbyterian faith tradition, the time seemed to me to be focused on shame, guilt, restriction and hopelessness. It was not my favorite season. Seeing the expansiveness of God invited me into deeper, and yes, more risky paths of faith as I became an adult. The Creator is wildly beyond our comprehension and control.

How do we draw deeper and closer to such Divine wildness?

One way I've found helpful is to meditate on where I currently am in this moment. Not where I want to be or how I want the world to change or when I reach an arbitrary weight goal in the gym. We are not defined by labels, jobs, or our goals. Every small detail of our "now" is sacred - in the Beatitudes, Jesus blesses those in need, experiencing difficulty, serving others, doing the best they know to do, being persecuted for who they are. Not those who have it all together. Not those who have all the answers. But those in the wildernesses of life.

The Creator meets us where we are in our wilderness and blesses us. The music through Easter reflects this kaleidoscope of God meeting us in every moment. There are blessings, calls to serve, songs about how much God loves us, the comfort of Jesus as our Refuge. All of this to remind us we never walk alone.

What we seek in Lent to draw deeper and closer to has been present inside us all along.
