Dear Family and Friends of SPC,

As the soft light of spring begins to peek through the winter chill, we prepare to embark on the Lenten journey. Ash Wednesday, on March 5th, marks the beginning of a season dedicated to reflection, introspection, and a deeper connection with our faith. This year, our Lenten theme, "*The Hardest Part, Hurt We Carry, Hope We Find,*" invites us to confront the fragility and fears that often weigh us down, and to discover the transformative power of hope found in Christ.

In 2 Corinthians 5:20-6:10, the Apostle Paul speaks of the paradoxes inherent in a life of faith. He writes of being "sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; poor, yet making many rich; having nothing, and yet possessing everything." These words resonate deeply

with our Lenten theme, reminding us that life is not always linear, and that our strength is often found in our vulnerability.

We are, as humans, inherently fragile. We carry hurts, anxieties, and uncertainties. There is no cure for being human, no magic wand to erase our pain. But we are not meant to navigate these challenges alone. Lent reminds us that we are part of a community, a body of believers who support and uplift one another. And, most importantly, we are held by a God who understands our struggles, who walks with us through our darkest valleys.

On Ash Wednesday, we receive the symbol of reality on our foreheads—a reminder of our mortality, our human limitations. This act, while somber, is also profoundly liberating. As writer James Finley observes, "God is the presence that spares us from nothing, even as God unexplainably sustains us in all things." This is the heart of the Lenten paradox: in acknowledging our brokenness, we open ourselves to God's boundless grace.

Think about the paradoxes that are central to a life of faith. We find strength in surrender, hope in despair, and life in death. How do you experience the tenderness of love? Is it in the quiet moments of prayer, in the embrace of a loved one, or in the beauty of creation that surrounds us?



Mary Oliver, in her poem, reminds us, "it is a serious thing just to be alive on this fresh morning in this broken world." Indeed, it is. But it is also a gift, a sacred opportunity to witness and experience God's presence in the midst of our brokenness.

This Lent, let us embrace the journey with open hearts. Let us confront the hurts we carry, share our fears, and seek the hope that Christ offers. Let us remember that our fragility is not a weakness, but a testament to our humanity, and that in God's love, we find the strength to endure.

We invite you to join us for our Ash Wednesday service (5:30pm Pancake Dinner and 6:30pm Worship), and for the various Lenten programs and studies that will be offered throughout the season. May this Lent be a time of profound transformation, as we journey together toward the hope we find in Christ.



### WHAT IS LENT?




Lent is a solemn period in the Christian calendar lasting 40 days (excluding Sundays) that begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes on Holy Saturday.


We enjoyed **Dental Health Month** with a visit from Mrs. Davis. She talked about what to expect at the dentist and handed out dental supplies for each student.

#### Souper " Bowl Sunday

**The "Souper" Bowl began in 1990** in a Presbyterian church in Columbia, SC and our church began participating a few years later. A simple prayer by a young intern, *"let us not forget those who do not have a bowl of soup to eat"* began a movement on Super Bowl Sunday. On the Sunday the Super Bowl is played, youth throughout the US began collecting money in "soup pots" at the end of worship

to be donated to a local food pantry. For many years, our contributions went to Greensboro Urban Ministry, For the last five years, our Benevolence team has chosen **Spartan Open Pantry (UNCG Food Pantry)** as the recipient of SPC "Souper Bowl" offering .

Thank you to **Charlotte and Hattie Craven and Ava and Genevieve Hadley**, who held the soup pots as members gave generously to this important offering. **\$491 was received and sent to the Spartan Open Pantry**. Thank you to our congregation for supporting this ministry each year which enables many students at UNCG who have very limited income to be able to have food.



### Church World Service (CWS) Response to Federal Grant Cuts

As of 5:00 pm, Feb. 3rd, Church World Service Greensboro had to furlough 2/3 of their staff. The im- **CHURCH WORLD SERVICE** Greensboro serves annually. Without CWS Greensboro's programming, these individuals are at risk of losing their housing, health care, benefits, employment, and educational services.

At its winter meeting on February 11<sup>th</sup>, Salem Presbytery heard a heart-rending and moving report from Mary Ellen Poe, Associate Director of Development for Church World Service (CSW) and a member of Westminster Presbyterian Church in Greensboro, on the adverse impacts of federal policy changes on refugee resettlement programs that our churches—among others—have supported for decades since the end of World War II. Her words and witness will be a lasting memory for all who attended the Presbytery meeting.

Later, Tony De La Rosa, Salem Presbytery Executive Presbyter, reported that in light of CWS's extraordinary plea for support, the Committee on Church Growth and Transformation (CGAT) of Salem Presbytery pledged to match gifts from Salem Presbytery congregations to CWS dollar-for-dollar up to a maximum of \$25,000 (twenty-five thousand dollars). If donations and a full match are secured, Salem Presbytery alone can provide at least ten percent of CWS's half-million dollar goal for this campaign. Tony De La Rosa urged Salem congregations to prayerfully consider support of CWS during this pivotal and challenging time.

### Kim requested that our Benevolence Team contribute to this appeal. The Team agreed and a check for \$1,000 was mailed on Feb. 23<sup>rd</sup>.

The highest benevolence acts without purpose.



#### FOOD AND AGRICULTURE

Much of the fossil fuel energy used to produce food is consumed through the transportation of food from far distances. Did you know that food travels, on average, more than **1,500 miles** to your table? Energy is also consumed in large-scale industrial agriculture by the heavy use of pesticides and the fuel for farm equipment.

Eating locally and seasonally supports your local economy and ensures the livelihood of local family farmers.

### How To's:

- Find out where and when your town has farmers' markets or farm stands and support them! Search <u>http://www.localharvest.org</u> to find the ones closest to where you live.
- **Talk to local farmers.** Ask what led them to farming, what their farms are like, and what farming methods they use to treat pests and weeds. Knowing this information can help you make decisions as to what to buy.
- Find out if any local farms sponsor a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program. In a CSA, you pledge an advance commitment to buy direct from that particular farm during its growing season. In return, you are ensured a regular supply of fresh product and the farm is ensured a predictable and sustainable customer. Most CSAs are open to your visiting the farm to become even more familiar with the food you eat. Search <a href="http://www.localharvest.org">http://www.localharvest.org</a> to find a CSA near you.
- Ask your grocery stores when and where they stock local produce. If they do not, ask them why and would they consider doing so in the future.
- Eat at restaurants that cook with local ingredients.

We are not the owners of creation; rather, "the earth is the Lord's, and everything in it" (Psalm 24:1).
